The highlight of the evening was a unique collaboration between artist Hannah Quinlivan and Australian mezzo-soprano Shikara Ringdahl, resulting in a mesmerising performance piece.



Currently on display in the main gallery, don't miss Hannah Quinlivan's thought-provoking exhibition, "Residuals and Residues." Delving into the intersections of history and present experiences, Quinlivan's work explores the remnants of the past and their impact on our sense of identity and place. Using experimental spatial-drawing techniques, she uncovers the intricate textures, patterns, and emotions that shape our social relations. As a versatile artist, Quinlivan seamlessly moves between disciplines such as textiles, sculpture, design, and installation, addressing contemporary issues with her unique and recognisable style.

In the Small Object Space gallery, Talitha Kennedy is showing her captivating exhibition "Skin Geography". Through the intricate use of specialist glover's leather, needle, and thread, Kennedy brings to life her psychological landscapes. The finger-like extremities, contained yet bursting with vitality, symbolise the paradox of natural forces in our constructed world. Experience her mastery of black leather as the primary medium in this must-see exhibition, which has graced esteemed galleries across Australia.



And finally, in the Machinery Street gallery window, we are being treated to Dr Julie-Anne Milinksi's work "Three Growing Forms, and an Adamant Creeper." Drawing inspiration from surrealist artwork and a dormant plant cutting, her multidisciplinary practice delves into humanity's relationship with the environment, highlighting interdependencies with other living beings and the vibrancy of introduced materials.

NATIONAL RECONCILIATION WEEK

27 May - 3 June 2023



National Reconciliation Week took place May 27 - June 3 this year and called on all Australians to "Be a Voice for Generations." The week is a time for all Australians to learn about our shared histories, cultures and achievements, and to explore how each of us can contribute to achieving reconciliation in Australia.





Walk on Country

Turbal Elder, Aunty Kathy Fisher led a Walk on Country during the week where workers, residents, community members and school students were invited to hear the history of the Brisbane Showgrounds area. This was a unique opportunity for all involved to foster a deeper connection to the land and learn of its cultural significance. Following the walk, attendees gathered in Alexandria Park where they savoured a delightful morning tea catered by Indigenous catering company, Figjam and Co.





Lunch & Learn

Students from Fortitude Valley Secondary College were invited to attend a lunch and learn event at Lendlease as part of National Reconciliation Week. We were lucky enough to be joined by guest speakers Troy Casey and Erin Mcdonald from Blaklash, a First Nations design agency that works in partnership with artists, designers and creatives to enrich public spaces and strengthen the connection between people and Country. Troy, as the director of Blaklash, is passionate about creating positive social change for First Nations Australians and Erin, a proud Aboriginal woman, is able to embed her culture throughout the design process. Troy and Erin, shared their expertise in integrating site-specific First Nations narratives into public art curation, interior design, landscape and the built environment.





The staff and students were then treated to an interactive session hosted by Jacob Davidson, a proud Gunditjmara, Ngarrindjeri & Wotchabuluk man, from Figjam & Co. This 100% Aboriginal-owned company focuses on providing naturally delicious catering options, sourcing local ingredients from First Nations owned and operated properties. Jacob led all the attendees through a talk where everyone was able to learn about bush foods of the region and how Figjam & Co are currently utilising bush foods to transform the native foodscape. At the end of the talk, attendees were able to enjoy a generous lunch spread featuring local and native ingredients.

NAIDOC Week

This year, NAIDOC Week took place over July 2 - 9 with the theme "For Our Elders"




"Our Elders have and continue to guide our generations and pave the way. It is their influence and through their learnings that we take the paths we are on today.

Meet the team behind the new build

We sat down with Glenn Liebke, the Hutchies Site Health and Safety Advisor on the Exhibition Quarter project to chat all things King St and the latest addition to the street.



Glenn Liebke Hutchies Site Health and Safety Advisor





Can you tell me a bit about your history working for Hutchies and your time on King St?

I've been with Hutchies since 2003, commencing with internal fit-out, general construction labouring and health and safety. Around 2009 I moved into my current role as Site Health and Safety Advisor, and throughout my time have been able to work across a variety of projects from hospitals, tunnels, hotels, retail complexes, cinemas and residential apartments and high-rise units. I'm currently working on the new Exhibition Quarter build here on King St.

Can you share with us any memorable moments or milestones that have stood out from this build so far?

There's been plenty of highlights! We often get children watching the machinery from the Alexandria Street driveway and it's fun to see them being so fascinated by it. We always try to hand them out a Hutchies kids hard hat or football to take home and it really lights their faces up.

I'm sure the team would say a big highlight for them has been the BBQs. I'm actually a chef by trade, so a few times I've fired up the barbie and put something on the spit for everyone, it's been really great for morale around the site.

All in all this project has been a joy; it's been great to have the opportunity to provide a safe, productive and happy work environment which has, and continues to have, minimal impact on the local environment and local residents and visitors to the area. The walk into the site isn't too bad either! Alexandria Park is so well maintained and sometimes I even spot a curlew on my walk in.

How do you think this new build will impact the precinct and community around it? Can you share any positive stories that have emerged from this build so far?

Hutchinson Builders always make an effort to support locals, where it can. The team has definitely made their fair share of coffee and food purchases in the precinct, which I'm sure has given a boost to the local economy.


To be able to work on this innovative, build-to-rent development is huge. We're excited to play an important role in boosting the supply of high-quality, long-term rentals in Australia. We're also proud to be working with Lendlease to uphold their sustainability commitments. The new build is going to be fully electric, which means it has the ability to be 100% powered by renewable energy.

What has been your favourite thing about working on King St?

It's definitely been the community. Everyone is always so happy and approachable; from the staff to the residents, we've felt so welcomed. We're a huge fan of the amount of dogs around the precinct too, we always try to give them a pat as they walk past.

And of course, it's been great having such an excellent selection of food and coffee venues available. May need to watch the waistline though, which is hard as every walk past the King Street Bakery leads to temptation.

This enjoyable activity provides children with the opportunity to interact with Indigenous art, discovering its profound symbolism and storytelling traditions.

Emma Hollingsworth

We are incredibly privileged to be showcasing the remarkable artwork of First Nations artist, Emma Hollingsworth in our precinct on Machinery Street and were lucky enough to sit down and chat with Emma herself.

For our readers who may not know you, could you tell us a little bit about yourself?

I'm a proud Kaanju, Kuku Ya'u, Girramay woman who grew up in tropical far North Queensland and am now operating my business Mulganai in Meanjin. I work full time as an artist and I create vibrant, colourful, contemporary pieces that are a depiction of myself as a young woman living in this modern world and tying in my culture and heritage. I feel so lucky and blessed to be doing something I love for a living.

Could you tell us a little bit about your experiences growing up and what influenced you to become an artist?

I grew up in the bush in this little community called Yarrabah which is about 30 minutes outside of Cairns and is actually one of the biggest Indigenous communities in Australia. I was a proper bush kid growing up - I hated wearing shoes and would play outside constantly climbing trees with my siblings. Being creative has always been a huge part of my life - Mum even says I used to paint on the walls when I was younger, which I'm sure she loved. I've always loved creating and painting, so when I was 19 I decided I wanted to follow my passions and that's when Mulganai was born.

What does NAIDOC week mean to you?

NAIDOC Week is genuinely one of the most exciting events on the calendar for us Mob. We love it so much we've even started calling it Black Christmas. It's just this huge celebration and a whole week that's solely ours. A week where our creativity, singing and dancing is recognised, supported and highlighted. Every industry really gets involved, which I love.



How did you celebrate NAIDOC Week?

I actually went to the Musgrave Park Family Fun Day. It was this really incredible day festival and was honestly the biggest NAIDOC event I've ever seen. It was amazing to see so many people out celebrating and the display of culture was incredible.

Can you share with us the meaning behind the name Mulganai?

When my mum was pregnant with me I had an aunty who blessed my mum with that name and my mum passed it on to me when I was born. It's actually legally my middle name, and I decided to take it and use it as my artist name. Mulganai translates to 'morning star' which represents a guiding light, in an abstract way, and this is why it was the perfect choice. When I started Mulganai, it really was a saving grace for me, as it took me out of this place where I didn't know where I belonged.

Tell me a bit about the inspiration behind the King St piece?

The piece is called Chulki and is actually one of the very first pieces I created for Mulganai. It holds a special place in my heart, as it is one of the first prints I created that was successful and was a real turning point for me and my business. The painting represents a chulki, or a pipi shell, which is a molluse, similar to an oyster. When we were kids growing up, we would go hunting for oysters and chulki and things on the beach all the time, so it's really just a fun memory from my childhood.

How would you describe your artistic style?

I would say my style is colour, vibrant and bright. I love creating really happy pieces that will bring a smile to people's faces. Now and then I still enjoy playing with some darker colours, like the dark blue you can see in my Chulki piece.

How can people support you and other indigenous artists?

You can follow me on Instagram @mulganai and head to my website (www.mulganai.com) where I sell my pieces as prints or on merchandise like notebooks, clutches and mugs that you can purchase.




Parking offers on King St
